PAST BRIM RESIDENT RECEIVES AN OAM



Former Brim resident Ron Goudie, an accountant, now living in Horsham with his wife Sue, was awarded an Order of Australia Medal on the King's Birthday long weekend in June.

Ron was born in Beulah and lived at Beulah before moving with his parents, brother Phil and sister Lois to Simson Street Brim in 1959.

Ron played tennis for Brim, and along with his doubles partner Roger Collins was known to be the top doubles pair in the competition. He began his tennis in Brim on the dirt courts close to where he lived, and was involved in planning the update of the courts when they were sealed for the first time.

While living in Brim, Ron also played badminton in the Brim Hall, social Bowls with

his father and Football for the Brim.

After leaving school, Ron first worked for the Dixon brothers George and Roy who owned the Brim Store, before starting with the Warracknabeal Flour Mill for the next two years.

He was then transferred to the Melbourne plant before moving back to Murtoa. His last involvement with the Flour Mill was in a management role at Newport.

He later purchased an irrigation property at Drung where he ran cattle and sheep for 6 to 8 years. He also joined Peter Irwin in establishing a fuel business in Horsham where he used his accounting skills.

Ron has been involved in a number of organisations in Horsham.

Over the years, he has been:

Secretary and Treasurer of the Dock Lake Reserve where he assisted in re-building the Drung South Tennis Clubrooms after it was destroyed by fire. He also helped with the rebuilding of the Taylors Lake football change rooms.

He has been both Treasurer and President of the Horsham City Bowling Club, President of the Horsham United Football Club,

Secretary of the Green Lake Reserve.

President, Vice President and Auditor of Wimmers Growers of Australian Plants Treasurer of Wimmera Improvement Committee

Chair of Little Desert Bio-link

He has been the book-keeper for Hospice Care and has also been involved with the Badminton Club, Drung Riverside Landcare and Horsham Landcare.

Ron is also the current President and a past Treasurer of Wimmera River Improvement Committee,

He was also awarded the Horsham Citizen of the year in 2015 and the Dame Phyllis Frost Award for Keep Australia Beautiful in 2018.

LIBRARY DROP-OFF IN BRIM

The Library Van visits the Brim General store on a fortnightly basis around 9.00am. Anyone wishing to use this facility can drop borrowed books at the shop prior to the day.

Books, Audio books and DVDs can be borrowed through this service. Specific items or items on a specific topic can be borrowed through this library service.

When ordered items have been delivered to Brim, a book delivery card will be placed with your mail. Library membership forms should be available at the store. For further information, please ring 0353 980 100.

Dates for the Library drop off will be August 13th and 27th, September 10th and 24th and October 8th and 22nd.

WASTE AND RECYCLING

General rubbish is collected weekly in the Yarriambiack Shire. Collections for the Brim area are on Fridays and in Warracknabeal on Tuesday (South side of Phillips St, town side of creek and railway lines) and on Thursdays (north side of Phillips St, west side of the creek and railway line).

Mixed recycling is collected fortnightly (lightly shaded) with one Friday each month when glass is collected (marked in purple). (see Calendar below).



It is recommended to leave your bins out the night before with a minimum 1 metre clearance from other obstacles.

Please do not place dangerous items such as needles or sharp articles in your bin.

Free disposal: A range of items of items that can be recycled can be delivered to the transfer station free of charge.

These include: green waste 1 metre squared,

E-Waste—all electrical and electronic goods with a cord or battery,

Mixed recyclables—sorted— paper, plastic containers, bottles and cans,

And cardboard—separated and in domestic amounts only.

Fees are charged for the disposal of vehicle tyres, builders waste, dead animals, lead batteries and mattresses.

It is also charged for larger quantities of green waste, timber, cardboard, and general waste.

Asbestos disposal cost a minimum of \$2 per kilogram and must be double wrapped in builder's plastic. There is a limit of 25 kilograms per household per day.

The Warracknabeal Transfer station is at 108 Tip Road Warracknabeal.

Yarriambiack Shire Council is launching a new collection point for blister packs in our reception area at the Warracknabeal Municipal Office. There will also be a recycling container in the Little Yellow Wagon - that visits a number of small towns each month.

Since starting the collection of blister packs in 2022, Pharnacycle has removed over 82 million blister packs, keeping them from landfill. All recovered materials are stored and reprocessed locally.
