

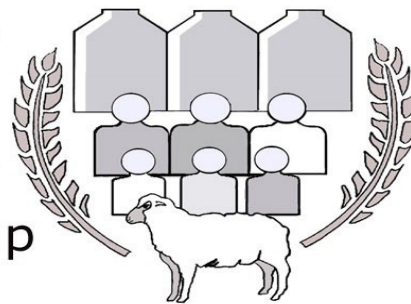

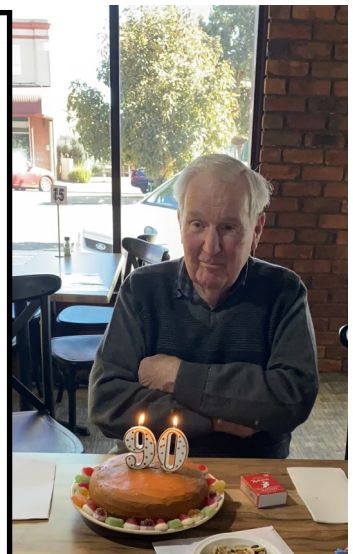

Yarriambiack Shire Council to transition remaining kindergarten services to Emerge Early Years Services.

At last week's ordinary meeting of Council, Councillors endorsed the transfer of Minyip, Rupanyup and Warracknabeal kindergarten services to Emerge Early Years Services following recent community consultation. Yarriambiack Shire as of August 2025, only operates three kindergarten services with Murtoa Kindergarten closing at the end of 2024, due to the opening of the Early Learning Victoria Bani Wallup Childcare and Kindergarten Service in Murtoa. The minimum number of Kindergartens to be part of a cluster is three.

With Beulah and Hopetoun transitioned to Emerge and plans underway to re-establish long day care service in Hopetoun, an opportunity arose to review Council's approach to service delivery.

Mayor Zanker said: "Our Council identified Emerge as the operator of our services to further improve outcomes for our children. She noted that, Emerge offers key advantages as a single, local provider familiar with the community and regional challenges, and delivers services efficiently across multiple rural Local Government areas to achieve economies of scale"

"Emerge offers advantages as a single, local provider familiar with the community and regional challenges and delivers service efficiently across multiple rural local government areas.

In addition, Mayor Zanker continued, "Centralising functions such as enrolments, payroll, financial, and human resources (including recruitment) enables funds to be directed back into improving the quality of services, pedagogical leadership, professional development and specialised service support in classroom, which provides a greater benefit to our communities and staff."

"Chief Executive Officer, Tammy Smith stated that, "Since October 2024, Council has partnered with Emerge to oversee the operations of early years services across the Yarriambiack Shire. This has resulted in positive outcomes for staff and families. Emerge efficiently managed Yarriambiack Shire Council enrolments for 2026, releasing them earlier than previous years."

Continuing, she said, " Furthermore, Danielle Thompson, Manager of Early Years and Transition at Emerge, who works collaboratively across local centre, has established strong relationships with staff, families and parent advisory groups. It is envisaged that the transition would occur in a staged approach, with Rupanyup and Minyip being the first two centres to transition, followed by Warracknabeal.

"The aim will be for all centres to be transitioned by the end of 2025" concluded Mrs Smith.

Yarriambiack Shire Council Seeks Urgent Support to Keep Vital Weather Station Operational.**

Yarriambiack Shire Council is calling for urgent support to safeguard the future of the Warracknabeal Automated Weather Station (AWS), a critical piece of infrastructure relied upon by emergency services, aviators, the agricultural industry, and the broader community.

The Council currently owns and maintains the Warracknabeal AWS—One of two in the municipality—under a ten-year service agreement with the Bureau of Meteorology. Unlike most weather stations across Australia, which are managed entirely by the Bureau, the Council is responsible for all servicing and maintenance costs.

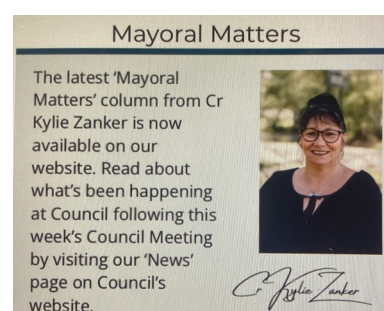
"Our weather station has provided vital, real-time data to the region since 1969, supporting not only local needs but also feeding into global and regional weather monitoring," said Yarriambiack Shire Council Mayor, Kylie Zanker. "The importance of this data cannot be overstated, especially during high-risk events such as the Little Desert National Park fire earlier this year."

However, the financial burden has grown unsustainable for Council. The annual servicing fee for the AWS is set to rise dramatically under the new three-year agreement— from \$12,700 to \$27,959 in the first year and approaching \$30,000 within three years—despite servicing intervals being reduced to one service per annum.

Without external financial support, Council will be unable to maintain the AWS to the required standard, leading to its proposed decommissioning on October 31st 2025.

"Losing this facility would be a significant setback for our community," Mayor Zanker stated. "We have written to Federal and State Ministers, as well as the Victorian Emergency Management Commissioner, seeking their urgent assistance to ensure the station remains in service.

Council is urging all levels of government to recognise the indispensable value of the AWS Warracknabeal and to work together to secure its future for the benefit of all who rely on its data.





Managing Fruit Fly

Spring is here and that means we have to get started on the annual process of dealing with Queensland Fruit Fly.

To reduce the risk of attracting Queensland fruit fly to your garden:

- Keep your garden free from unwanted, fallen and rotten fruit to remove potential breeding spots.
- Pick and use fruit or vegetables as they ripen or harvest the produce early if it will ripen after it's picked.
- Choose dwarf varieties of fruit trees which are easier to cover with netting and to inspect for damage.
- Reduce the size your trees so they don't produce more fruit than you need.
- Remove any unwanted or neglected host trees and replace them with early-maturing host plants or non-host alternative plants such as local wattles or grevilleas.

We'd like to remind all residents that the Yarriambiack Shire have free green waste all year round - residents can drop off a cubic metre of organic garden green waste - prunings, clippings, lawn mowing debris etc - per visit to our transfer stations.

Fire inspections to commence

Yarriambiack Shire Council will commence their annual Fire Hazard Identification Program, starting October 2025. These inspections will seek to identify potential fire hazards on all residential properties located in townships within the Yarriambiack Shire.

All property owners are advised to maintain their properties by slashing dead or long dry grass, and to remove fuels such as dead branches or piles of cut vegetation. It is the property owner's responsibility to reduce the threat a fire poses to their home and to their surrounding neighbours.

Inspections will start in the Northern Ward of the municipality in October 2025, then progress to the Central Ward and Southern Ward by November 2025.

Property owners with properties identified to be a potential fire hazard will be issued a Fire Prevention Notice (CFA Act 1958). Failing to comply with a Fire Prevention Notice within the specified time may result in the property owner being issued an Infringement Notice for \$2,040.00, in addition to associated costs.
